



WHERE TO FIND US

Getting here

The Central Coast is located in New South Wales, on the east coast of Australia. Situated north of the state's capital, Sydney, and south of Newcastle.

The Central Coast is a region full of inviting waterways, pristine beaches and abundant natural beauty. It provides for the quintessential Australian escape, but offers much more than a traditional beach holiday experience.



Car

Head north out of Sydney on the Pacific Highway, then get onto the M1 Pacific Motorway.

From Wahroonga

There are three key exits to access the Central Coast:

- **Central Coast Highway -**
Signs marked Gosford, Woy Woy, Terrigal.
- **Wyong Road -**
Signs marked Wyong, Tuggerah, The Entrance, Yarramalong.
- **Sparks Road -**
Signs marked, Wyong, Warnervale, Wyee, Toukley.

Other exits to visit the **hinterland** include - Mooney Mooney, Calga, Somersby and Peats Ridge and Ourimbah exits from the M1.

When travelling from Newcastle, follow either the M1 Pacific Motorway or A43 Pacific Highway south to reach the Central Coast.



Train

NSW TrainLink runs regular rail services to the Central Coast departing approximately every half-hour from Sydney and every hour from Newcastle, with travel time approx 1 hour and 30 minutes from each destination. Key stations to disembark include Woy Woy, Gosford, Ourimbah, Tuggerah and Wyong.



Ferry

Palm Beach Ferries operate daily services between Sydney (Palm Beach) and the Central Coast (Ettalong Beach). Visit the Palm Beach Ferry website, or call 02 9974 2411.



Bus

Take the scenic route and hop on the bus to see the sights. Buses depart regularly from key Central Coast railway stations and the Ettalong ferry wharf to towns like Terrigal, Avoca Beach, Woy Woy, Long Jetty, Soldiers Beach and other attractions. Plan your trip at www.transportnsw.info.



Air

Newcastle Airport is located approx 115km, 1 hour 15 minutes drive from Gosford. Sydney Kingsford Smith Airport is located approx 85 km, 1 hour 20 minutes drive from Gosford, or is easily accessible via train.

A mobile holiday


We're proud to offer accessible beach features across the Coast.

To improve access and inclusion for people with limited mobility or living with a disability, during the lifeguard season from September to April, Central Coast Council provides beach wheelchairs at 15 of our beaches and has installed beach matting at four popular locations.

The Central Coast has 200km of stunning off-road shared pathways following natural waterways, lakes and pristine coastline. Our foreshore walks are an easy way to reconnect to nature with inclusive playgrounds, toilets and water fountains along the way. Many businesses have highly accessible offerings for things to do on the Coast.






